
Our highlighted shipmate this addition is Chuck Dryden. He is pictured to the left in his golf cart with his dog Brutus.

Chuck was part of our VC10 Squadron.

He was born 12/6/26 in Kalispel, Montana and about age one his family moved to

California. He grew up and attended school in Fullerton, CA. He joined the Navy in Nov 1943 with parents permission but couldn't start training until after his 17th birthday. In Jan 44 he began training at San Diego and from there went to Nattc Memphis, TN for radio school, then Jacksonville and Ft Lauderdale, FL for gunnery school after which he was assigned to VC10.



Chuck sent the picture to the left and the following e-mail to me.

I'm the one on the left, Chuck Dryden (ARM3), Ens Lonnie Mckeel, center and Pepe Morgan (MM3). I "enjoyed" numerous dowsings from Pepe from his turret directly above my radio position in the TBM due to his air sickness, but thats all part of war.

This picture was taken shortly before deployment on the USS Fanshaw Bay in 1945 of the reformed VC10 squadron.

The squadron was transported from NAS North Island by two other carriers to Guam where we boarded the Fannie Bee and headed north west to Adak and then into Ominata, Japan for occupation as the war had ended.

Since I was regular Navy and had over a year yet to serve, I recycled to BP4y2 Privateers and ended my service in October 1947 at NAS Correy Field, near Pensacola in charge of the station base radio only to be recalled in Sept 1950 because of my training in 4y2's. In July 1950 I had decided it would be fun to fly again so volunteered as a weekend warrior at NAS Alamitos. But never attended a drill when I got the wire I'd been activated with VP772, the only Navy squadron still flying the 4y2. Pres Truman had decided to give that aircraft to the French still fighting the Viet Minh in Indo China. Since we were not at war the "gift" had to be covert. Our first assignment was to Island hop five unmarked planes across the Pacific in civilian clothes with no personal identification to Saigon. All across the pond we got questions everywhere about who we were and where we were going. We'd been warned not to talk about the missions purpose or destination. After that episode the squadron spent 8 months in Japan and Korea at Pusan flying coast patrols and night parachute drops.

Letter from Cesare A. Ciantra:

Oct 25, 1944 In the Sea, I drifted onto a group of men who were hanging on a section of a flight deck plank that was blow into the sea. There were 16 men on board, I made it 17. One of the men was an officer Lt. V. Bell. I held onto the plank al day long and all night. Early on the 26th I drifted away and into a group of men that were holding onto a life raft. There was one sailor who was laying on top of the raft. Also one of the men was the C.P.O., who I knew for a short period of time. I was in E Division and was assigned to him for M.P. Duty. On this day the sailor on the top of the raft passed away. His personal things and dog tag were given to the C.P.O. The sailor was buried at sea, all are prayers were with him, then and for ever.

After reading the March 2010 Scuttlebutt that Sailor was Leonard G. Martin-SC 1/c.

(After getting this letter I cried. I found Cesare's phone number and called him. We had a long conversation and it became a little emotional for me. I guess you never know what will trigger your memory. My Scuttlebutt article did that for Cesare. Thank you so much for this story about yourself and my uncle. God Bless- Marlene)
